  - o What portion of either sermon represents one anchor point in the culture of the day? Why do you think this?
  - o What portion of either sermon begins to bridge to Kingdom Culture? Why do you think this?
2. Why do you think it is important to learn the language of the person with whom want to communicate?
  - o In most cases here in Blacksburg you will be communicating in English and you already know the language, so what do you think it means to speak of significant things that matter to that person?
3. Why do you think it is important to learn the culture of the person with whom you wish to communicate?
  - o In Blacksburg can you automatically assume that everyone has the same cultural or world view? Why or why not?
  - o How will understanding a person's cultural or world view help you to build a bridge to Kingdom Culture for that person?
4. What do you think Jeff meant by being a fearless failure?
  - o Does it bring you comfort to know that everyone has problems effectively sharing their faith or does it scare you even more? Why or why not do you think this?
5. Have any of you experienced subtle and sometimes stunning successes as you have worked alongside God to build Kingdom Culture bridges? If you have, would you be willing to share them with the group?
6. How would relating your own story add weight to the gospel message?
7. What do you think Jeff meant about leaving room for the miraculous?
  - o Have you seen God work in unexpected ways? If so, would you be willing to share this with the group?
